## STEPHEN MAGSIG

## Empathy for the city

Stephen Magsig doesn't just see New York
City, he feels it. It is something he has
difficulty explaining and, instead, relies
on Edward Hopper's famous quote that "If you
could say it in words, there would be no reason
to paint." And, like Hopper, Magsig captures
the pulse of the city in his paintings, showing
storefronts, streetscapes and everyday corners
deep within the heart of the city.

"I've been shooting in New York since the mid-1990s and I like the earlier images I took because I feel that they've cleaned the city up a little too much for my tastes," says Magsig. "It's too slick today and doesn't interest me as much."

Magsig is not a photorealist. While his

work is detailed, he prefers to spend time in the shadows and corners of his scenes rather than the infinite details. And, in doing so, he enjoys working from photographs that he has taken throughout his artistic career.

"I work from the screen with the digital images like many artists now and I really find that it allows me to capture so much in each photo," explains Magsig. "It allows me to really hone in on the shadow areas and see into it and know what is going on in there instead of just guessing."

Shadows and the effects they have on buildings is an important aspect of Magsig's work. Magsig takes quiet city scenes—the front of a café or an ordinary nondescript street corner—and imbues it with shadows and other lighting effects to create complex works filled with interesting compositional and design elements.

"I want to show beauty where people typically don't expect it to exist," says Magsig. "I enjoy these scenes because they allow me to close in on things and see what is truly there. In this type of work, you can't just paint like a landscape painter, you have to think and look, concentrate on what you're painting and try and recreate that light, shadow and form."
